The leader's foreword is at best misleading and therefore unsound.

The Council's Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) states at 1.1 that *South Oxfordshire District Council is committed to working in a clear and transparent way.*

The foreword written by the Leader and Cabinet Member for Planning is the most likely section for members of the public to rely on for a clear and transparent exposition of the strategy and of the scope and intention of the Plan.

It is at best misleading.

a. At line 2 it states that the Local Plan "sets out the identified need for housing and employment" whereas in fact, as page 31 makes clear, it relies on the 2014 SHMA (Strategic Housing Market Assessment) for its "evidence base", a SHMA that is now out of date. The household formation projections and population forecasts on which it is based have now been replaced by the 2016 projections – both lower – and if the SHMA were to be updated as it should have been, and as neighbouring Oxford has done, it could reasonably be expected to come up with a much lower figure. Furthermore, the SHMA is now discredited as a mechanism for determining housing need and has been replaced by the new Objectively Assessed Need (OAN). The base of the new OAN would be approximately half the level of the SHMA and, although a floor not a ceiling, would almost certainly have led to a different total housing projection.

In fact, as page 31 also makes clear, the numbers in the Plan derive wholly from the Growth Deal, a Faustian pact between Local Councils and the Government, in which Oxfordshire Councils have agreed to build several multiples of the number of houses the pact itself explicitly recognises to be required, for money. The Growth Deal is referred to in the statement but is not acknowledged to be the actual driver of the Local Plan.

It is only right that the public should be advised of the true foundation and nature of the Plan on which they are being consulted, the outcome of which is a 50% increase in both housing stock and – as there is no underlying local need – population in the 23 years from 2011 to 2034. Instead they are being told that the Plan seeks to satisfy an "identified need for housing and employment" which any reader would take to be an actual need arising from the resident population. It is in any case not a "need" at all but an aspiration by our elected Local Governments to transform the nature of our area behind our backs.

- b. The Leader's statement continues that "we had planned to submit the November 2017 Publication version for examination but have reviewed the allocations amidst uncertainty regarding deliverability". In fact, the allocation on which the uncertainty centred Chalgroveremains in the Plan albeit somewhat reduced. They key change from the 2017 submission to this one is the introduction specifically ruled out in the previous plan process of the Green Belt releases around the fringe of Oxford City. Although 75% of the Oxfordshire and South Oxfordshire public is known to consider that Green Belt land should not be built on¹, and this is by far and away the most significant difference between the 2017 and 2019 plans, it is not mentioned.
- c. Neither is it mentioned that the number of houses planned has increased substantially between the two versions (although both claim to rely for their evidence base on the same 2014 SHMA figures). The main cause of the difference is a substantial increase in the contingency provided, although neither the increase in numbers nor its rationale are referred to.
- d. The Leader's statement refers to "several rounds of public consultation" and seeking to address many of the issues that have been raised". The previous rounds of consultation were however of a very different plan, notably in relation to both numbers and the Oxford Green Belt (and are, we submit, irrelevant to and not precursors of this Plan).

Public Consultation is an essential ingredient of the development of a Local Plan and the public is entitled to have the strategy and evidence presented in a clear and transparent way as indeed the District's SCI requires.

Although the whole plan is similarly opaque, the public is entitled above all to a clear accurate statement of strategy and justification from its elected representatives.

The foreword falls far short of that requirement, to the extent that it is at best misleading and is therefore unsound. As it is intended to be a precis of the key ingredients of the Plan, the Plan itself is equally unsound because of its inadequacy.

However, given the significant changes between this Plan and that previously consulted on, we submit that a new Regulation 18 consultation is in fact required.
